I THESSALONIANS 4:13-5:11

Review your memory verses (I Thessalonians 1:2-4, 1:6, 2:8, 3:2-3, 3:12, 4:11). Write the memory verse from I Thessalonians that has helped you most so far and tell why. Memorize I Thessalonians 4:16-17. Read I Thessalonians 4:13-5:11 through 2 or 3 times. Reread I Thessalonians 4:13-18. Evidently when Timothy returned to Paul he brought word that the Thessalonians were confused and questioning on a certain issue. According to Paul's response in verses 13-18, write out what you think could be their question. 3. Notice that these verses refer 3 times to those who are or have fallen asleep (verses 13, 14, 15). What does this mean according to verse 16? 4. What will happen to those who are in Christ (believers) and die before He returns to earth? 5. What will happen to those who remain alive until Jesus returns?

6.	How does Paul substantiate these facts? (See verses 14 and 15.)
7.	From verses 13 and 18 what were the two reasons Paul had for writing about this issue?
8.	Why are these facts an encouragement to you?
9.	Think about and comment on the phrase "that you may not grieve as do the rest who have no hope."
10.	Write out a prayer of thanksgiving to God on the basis of the facts given in 4:13-18. (Paul wrote out some of his prayers.)
	d I Thessalonians 5:1-11. What main idea is Paul addressing in this section?

12.	Verses 1-3 emphasize that they don't need to be told dates and times concerning the day of the Lord (which, here, refers to the return of the Lord for His own). What do they know about <i>how</i> it will come?
13.	This passage (5:1-11) contrasts the sons of darkness and the sons of light in relationship to the return of the Lord. Notice that <i>sleep</i> here means <i>indifferent</i> rather than <i>dead</i> in all except verse 10. What characteristics do you see in these two groups? Sons of light Sons of darkness
14.	Consider verse 8. What does the idea of being self-controlled and putting on armor suggest to you about the Christian life?
15.	We certainly couldn't be fighting <i>one another</i> with love, faith and the hope of our salvation. Wherein lies the battle and from what will we be protected?
16.	How does one carry out verse 11? Think especially about the material in this passage.

17.	What truth from this passage (I Thessalonians 4:13-5:11) was most helpful to you
	at this time?

18. One hymn that reflects our faith and emphasizes our hope is "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" by Charles Wesley. Sing or say this hymn to yourself and then sing together in class.
