MOSES - PART II

Review memory verses: Hebrews 11:25, 26. Be ready to quote them to the person next to you in class.

1. Has the Lord ever impressed upon your heart to speak to someone with a request or a warning and you knew they wouldn't listen? What feelings did that stir up in your heart and mind?

In our last lesson we learned that living by faith required one to make choices throughout one's life. We also learned that Moses felt called of God to help his people but he tried to accomplish this task in his own way and in his own time.

Read Hebrews 11:27, 28 and Exodus 2:11-15

- 2. a. What was the result of Moses' attempt to help his people?
 - b. Describe Moses' emotions according to verse 14.

Forty years later (Acts 7:30) God spoke to Moses from a miraculous burning bush. Moses, however, was not ready this time. He objected and resisted with complaints and excuses of not being adequate for the task. God told Moses, "I will send you to Pharaoh so that you may bring my people, the sons of Israel, out of Egypt"-- Exodus 3:10 (NAS). (This was not the same king from whom he fled earlier--Exodus 2:23.)

- 3. Theologians have not been able to agree on whether Hebrews 11:27 is speaking of Moses' first exit from Egypt in Exodus 2:15 or the second one here forecast in Exodus 3:10. Whichever the case, the verse in Hebrews describes Moses as fearless toward the king. Share how he demonstrated fearlessness in Exodus 11:8.
- 4. Moses was truly a different man. His faith had really grown. "The first forty years of his life Moses was learning that he was somebody. The second forty years he was learning that he was a nobody, and the third forty years he was learning what God could do with a nobody." Irving L. Jensen Do you find this quote encouraging or discouraging? Explain.

Even today many Jews will celebrate what they call "Pesah" which signifies the feast of the Passover because on that night God passed over them and sent plagues on the Egyptians. Exodus 12:42.
