The Power of Jesus' Name

Can you imagine the scene—priests and tax collectors, men and women, nationals and foreigners—all repenting and coming together as one in Christ? No wonder the unsaved religious leaders said, "By what power or by what name have you done this?" (Acts 4:7)

In the next two lessons we will learn how the early Jewish believers relied on the power of God alone to transform their culture. No gimmicks, no programs—just Jesus working in and through the wholly devoted disciples.

Bow in Prayer: "Lord Jesus, we come with humble hearts thanking You for the unspeakable privilege of being entrusted with the Name which is above every name. May all of our petitions be the cry of Your own Spirit within our hearts."

Read Acts 3:1-26 aloud. Pay close attention to the details of the narrative. Imagine yourself being part of the crowd at the temple, watching as the scene unfolds.

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- 2. *Glance* at the chart to get a "snapshot" of the larger context (chapters 1-7).
 - a. How many years are covered in the first seven chapters?
 - b. In what city do the events of chapters 1-7 occur?

Apparently some days had passed since the events of Pentecost. The crowds that had come for the Feast had returned home and the city had quieted down. At the close of chapter 2 Luke tells us that many "wonders and miraculous signs were done by the apostles" (2:43). Now he supplies an especially dramatic example.

woul name	g another's name always presupposes that He trusts us with His interests and that His honor d be safe in our hands. Our bearing the Name of Jesus shows that we have given up our own and with it, our own independent life. As Christ's servants the treasures and spiritual ers of the spiritual world are placed at our disposal to help those around us (John 14:13-14).

The healing bestowed upon this man gives him the capability of an entirely new life; it is a visual act that points to a deeper reality—an act that portrays what salvation does.

10. How would you sum up what it means to be healed spiritually, in your heart, when you believe in Jesus? (2 Corinthians 5:17; Romans 1:17, 8:1; Ephesians 1:3, 7; 1 Peter 1:18, 23; Colossians 1:13.)

Although Peter could have used this situation to strengthen his influence over the people, he responded as a true servant of God.

- 11. What possible misunderstanding of the miracle on the crowd's part did Peter anticipate in verse 12?
- 12. In Acts 3:11-16 Peter tells us *why* and *how* the lame man was healed. Who was Peter addressing in Acts 3:12, 17?
 - a. According to verse 13a *why* was this man healed?
 - b. According to verse 16 *how was* the lame man healed?

A good sermon introduction is supposed to capture attention and familiarize listeners to the subject at hand. Peter and John's healing of the lame man in the temple courts accomplished this in a powerful way! It drew a huge crowd of awed spectators and gave the apostles an open door to declare plainly that Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah who fulfilled all the predictions of the prophets.

13. The greatness of Peter's sermon is that it is all about Jesus. Look at each of the titles Peter gives to Jesus in verses 13-16. How does each title emphasize the uniqueness of our Lord?

14. **Reread** Acts 3:13-16. What other point does Peter drive home in this passage? Underline the word *you* every time it occurs in these verses.
